QUESTACON

On Friday 3rd June the Questacon Science Circus from the Australian National University visited our school. Reanna from Year 2 has shared what she learnt at the show.

The University students Clare and Adam, showed Stage 1 how aeroplanes fly in long distances. They taught us that when you push on air, it pushes back. They used a foam aeroplane to demonstrate this.

They also showed us how bubbles work. If you use a heart shaped wand to make a bubble, you might think that it makes a heart shaped bubble. However, it still makes a sphere like all bubbles. If you push the middle of a bubble, it will pop or bounce back to make a sphere again. Inside a bubble Clare asked a person to stand in a dish of soap and water mixed together. She used a wand with a circle handle bar and lifted the giant circle wand and that person was inside a bubble. Then it popped! I felt amazed throughout the whole show.


Next week we will enjoy a magical adventure with Mem Fox and continue to look at rhyming as a preparation for early spelling.

We went on the bus to learn about the olden days. We went there on Monday. We did the washing first. I did not like getting my hands wet. I would not like to live in the olden days because it was hard.


We went to the yokes next. It hurt my neck. I thought it was not fair because the kids had to do everything.

A parent or guardian must apply for students 15 years and under. Students 16 years and over must apply for themselves.

Who needs to apply

A new application is only required if the student has not had a School Opal card before.

Parents whose children already have a School Opal card and are changing schools or campuses will need to update their Opal card for the new school year before mid-December at **apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts**.

How to apply

Applications for 2017 open at the start of Term 4, 2016.

Step 1

Once the new school has confirmed the student's enrolment, complete the application at **transportnsw.info/school-students**

Step 2

Print, sign and date the completed application, then submit it to the student's new school for endorsement.

Step 3

The school then sends the endorsed application to Transport for NSW. Once approved, the School Opal card will be sent to the address provided on the application.
