

SCHOOL EXCELLENCE IN ACTION

As we move through our reflection period of our current 2018-2021 School Plan we continue to seek feedback about many areas of school life. The 'Tell Them from Me Parent Surveys' (TTFM) have been sent via SMS to all families earlier in the week. We encourage everyone to complete the survey which provides valuable information that guides our school's future directions, it only takes a few minutes. As a part of this process staff and students are also given opportunities to engage with their surveys.

<u>ATTENDANCE</u> UPDATE

It was pleasing to read in our Director's Attendance Report that Abermain Public School had recorded an attendance of above 90% last week. The Department of Education is focused on increasing student attendance across the state.

Our results for the last 3 weeks were 87.4%, 89.3% and 94.8%. This data shows a steady increase for this period and it is our aim to maintain this level of attendance. We continue to encourage students to be at school and on time if they are well. Families are reminded that they are to follow the Department of Health COVID-19 guidelines and keep students at home and seek medical advice, if they have flu-like symptoms.



Could you please check your child/children's hair for nits and lice tonight. Head lice are only found on the human head and often congregate on the crown of the head, so that is not until you reach these last sections of hair that you find adult lice. However, heads that are severely infected will have lice everywhere. Head lice do not live on furniture, hats, bedding, carpet or anywhere else in the environment. If you find any eggs or lice, please commence treatment. It is also recommended to repeat treatment every 5-6 days for the next couple of weeks to ensure all eggs have been removed.
